- 8. Richard Ruehle_reported on the Gallery show to be in Wooster from June 11th thru July 20th. The Cleveland, Akron and our club were to jointly plan and participate in the show. Richard was not informed of any meetings and was told that these were the 'rules':
 - There would be 100 pieces displayed, 30 of which would be allotted to three 'spotlighted' turners; one from each club.
 - There would be seven categories. You could enter for judging any number of items for \$5.00 each. Only 2 per category per person could be in the show.
 - Judging would be done of each club's pieces by the other 2 clubs. The 10 top judged item in each category would be in the show. So each club is guaranteed 10 pieces (the spotlighted turner) but the rest would be dependent on the judging. Our judges would need to travel to Cleveland and Akron.
 - There would be monetary prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each category.
 - Our club was being asked to contribute \$600
 - Items in the show could be sold with 20% going to the gallery.

NEWS FROM AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF WOODTURNERS

For those of you who are new, Central Ohio Woodturners is a chapter of a larger organization called The American Association Of Woodturners. The national organization consists of 275 local chapters for a total of more than 13,000 members. The following email was received from Larry Genender who is a current AAW board member and Chairperson of Chapters and Membership.

To the membership of local chapters,

We are having a membership drive. Only about half of all the members in the Chapters are AAW members, and this should really be much higher. Remember, besides all the tangible benefits of AAW membership, please impress upon your members that if not for the AAW there would be no chapters at all and we would all be toiling in our shops all by ourselves, all 13,009 of us re-inventing the wheel every day!

OK, here's the deal: Any member who signs up 5 new AAW members by Dec. 31, 2007 will receive a free registration to the AAW Symposium in Richmond VA, to be held June 20 – 22, 2008. A new member signing up in 2007 will receive all four 2007 issues of the American Woodturner journal. A new member signing up in 2007 may elect to have his/her membership begin in Jan. 2008 and still have that membership count towards the sponsor's total. If one of your Chapter members does sign up 5 new AAW members, please let me know the names of the persons you signed up and I will look after getting you your free Symposium registration

There are about 20 Chapters who currently have 100% AAW membership. We would like to see this number increase. All Chapters achieving 100% AAW membership will be recognized as AAW Star Chapters These Chapters will receive a set of the AAW Masters Series Videos and will be recognized by a plaque and be listed in the Resource Directory.

2008 Symposium Heads Up!

The hall in Richmond can only seat 1700 people at the Banquet and Auction next June. There may well be more than this number of attendees at the Symposium, which means that everyone who registers might not be able to be seated at the Banquet. Therefore we have had to remove the tickets for the Banquet from the registration packet, so that you will have to buy these tickets separately. Ohio Designer Craftsmen Seeks Turned Wood Entries for the Best of 2008 Juried Exhibition

The organization, Ohio Designer Craftsmen (ODC) represents a cross section of artists and crafters who produce fine work in a wide variety of craft media. The leaders of this group have expressed the idea that turned wood objects are woefully underrepresented in the fairs and exhibitions they sponsor. They have supplied COW with a number of entry forms for the upcoming juried exhibition which will be on display at the Craft Museum in May and June, at the Springfield Art Museum in July and August and the French Art Colony in Gallipolis in September and October giving the work wide exposure in central and southern Ohio.

A person entering the juried competition must be a member of ODC in order to participate, but the membership fee can be included with the \$15.00 entry fee. The submissions are made through digital or traditional photographs of up to three objects. The entry form provides all the details.

In addition, ODC, through its craft museum on Fifth Avenue in Columbus has expressed an interest in selling turned wood objects in its gift shop. Apparently, visitors to the exhibits there from other cities or states often want to purchase an item made in Ohio that will travel well in a suitcase or small box.
