# IN THE SPOTLIGHT

## Working with Bob Rosand

On April 4 and 5, I had the opportunity to study one-on-one with **Bob Rosand** in his Pennsylvania workshop. For well over 20 years, Bob has been an accomplished teacher, demonstrator, and writer on the subject of woodturning. So being his pupil is a dream come true, especially for someone who, according to some, should not be turning at all. I am blind and have found it difficult to get much-needed turning classes. Working with Bob appears to be the beginning of a long-lasting mentor-mentee relationship with someone who is willing to take on the challenges of working with a blind turner.

Let me digress. I have been fortunate to have found the Central Ohio Woodturners (COWs). Or maybe they have found me. Based on a turner's recommendation at an arts and craft show, I started attending the monthly COW meetings in spring 2007, and the support and knowledge I have received from them have helped my woodturning skills. At first, I attended the monthly meetings without many interactions with the other Club members, but the relationships built quickly.

I can only imagine what **Jim Burrowes** was thinking the first time I asked to try my hand at turning during one of his beginner sessions. When I completed a couple of cuts successfully, he was eager to show me more. During

another meeting, **Floyd Anstaett** helped by describing the cuts being made during a demonstration. The monthly Saturday morning mentoring sessions coordinated by **Chuck Kemp** have been invaluable. At one session, **Walt Betley** showed me how to turn spindle stock. He did great, although I do not know who was more nervous – him or me. Jim, Floyd, Chuck, Walt, COW President **Barb Crockett**, and COW Treasurer **Craig Wright** have all had a hand in providing me guidance.

The journey to an AAW Education Grant started in November 2007. The Club has its Show & Tell sessions at their monthly meetings,



and I try to take something each time so I can get feedback on how I can continue to improve. On this particular evening, I had brought in a peppermill that many people said I would not be able to turn. "It's too difficult. It has too many steps. It requires accuracy that

# Young Turners Program

As part of the AAW's effort to put more emphasis developing another generation of woodturners, the Central Ohio Woodturners (COW) is sponsoring an AAW Young Turners Program for youths between the ages of 10 and 18.

There are many reasons for our Club supporting a Young Turners Programs. One growing motivation becoming all too common is school budget cuts. Music, art, and industrial arts programs are the first to feel the spending shortfalls. Other reasons include providing programs for our local community, making better-rounded individuals, or simply the pleasure of helping others enjoy the craft that has been an important part of our lives. Whatever your driving force, for our chapter's program, the most important rule to remember - have fun!

## Two-Phase Program

There are two participation phases for the young turners. Phase One involves turning tops and honey dippers. These fun projects provide a setting for youths to learn the fundamentals of lathe safety and proper tool usage. At the end of the session, we will award the young turner a completion certificate that identifies the youth as a woodturning student. We will have three Phase One Sessions this summer, holding them at WoodWerks.

We will need volunteers from the Club, 1 for every 2 students, to aid in this effort. There will be up to 8 young turners in each session. We already have 6 young people who have expressed interest in the program, so if you are interested

in helping with this effort, contact Chuck Kemp (614.771.7861, ckemp001@columbus.rr.com) or Dave Bowers (740.927.9764, sbowers5@columbus.rr.com). You need to be a member of the AAW to help with this program. Being an AAW member allows you to be covered by the AAW's liability insurance.

Phase Two, scheduled for this fall, requires the young turner to complete 4 additional projects from a list of 15, including bowls, goblets, or pens, etc. The grant we have received from the AAW provides money for us to invite a well known turner to lead this second phase, allowing the young turners to become more involved with our Club and the mentors who assist with the program. When the youth completes Phase Two, he or she will receive a second completion certificate and complimentary one-year COW and AAW memberships.

## Web-based Materials

The Young Turners Program

is web-based, allowing us to obtain the required materials and certificates, as needed. Project outlines and teaching tips are available in PDF format for easy download and printing. The outlines have been developed by many familiar names throughout turning community. FAQ pages and further information are available on the AAW web site at <http://www.woodturner.org/community/youth>.

The Young Turners Program made its debut in Portland at the AAW symposium, and there are already exemplary programs run by chapters and individuals across the country. Jim Rodgers and Jacques Blumer wrote excellent articles about their experiences in the Winter 2006 issue of American Woodturner. •





# Stacked Ring Lamination



## From Board to Bowl

If you have collected a lot of lumber over the years like I have and are looking for a new project, then stacked ring lamination may be what your looking for. It is a process in which rings are cut from a flat board at predetermined angles and ring widths, then stacked and glued to form a bowl. The most common method is to cut half rings from two boards and glue them together to form solid rings.


To get started, choose two boards and lay them side by side. Hold the two boards together with tape so you can draw the rings with a compass.




For this project, I recommend using 3/4" lumber with 3/4" wide rings cut at a 45 degree angle. Remember the ring widths and cut angles are key to this process. Set your bandsaw table at 45 degrees and cut the rings.




Make sure to lightly sand all the edges of the rings to get rid of any burrs.



Glue the half rings together and lightly sand the top and bottoms of each glued ring on a flat board.



Next stack and glue the rings together, using a round of MDF with a rod threaded through it and a block tightened down on the rod to hold the pieces taut.



After the glue sets up on the rings, glue on the base. There are several ways for mounting the completed glue-up on the lathe.



You can glue a waste block to the blank and use a face plate or you can cut a tenon on the waste block or blank to hold in a chuck.



There are many different design possibilities because you can use different woods together, and by rotating the rings when gluing, you can come up with endless combinations and patterns. Basically your mind is the limit! •



is difficult for even those who are sighted." COW Past President **Andi Wolfe**, conducting the Show & Tell session that night, held up my piece and asked me to describe my work. When she realized it was mine, she announced that it was beautiful and encouraged others to take a look at it during the break. The entire Club gave me a round of applause. Words

cannot describe how proud I felt.

On November 28, a few days after that meeting, I received a note from COW Board Member Chuck Kemp, asking if I would be interested in pursuing an AAW Education Grant. I could not respond fast enough with a big, "You bet!" Things seem to move along pretty quickly after that. A few turning

instructors were contacted, with Bob Rosand responding that he would be willing to take on this student. After initial grant-writing with Andi, some revisions with the help of Barb Crockett, and a confirmation from Bob, we submitted the grant. The AAW contacted me by the end of March!

On April 3, my wife Genia and I departed for Bob's workshop, the 411-mile journey taking about 7 hours. Bob's place is tucked away in Amish country atop a ridge. His workshop is a converted home, with the kitchen, bedroom, and bath being the only original rooms. The shop is good sized with many power tools, including two Oneways.

The first day – with Bob demonstrating first, followed by this student performing the same activities – we started making tool handles that later would be used for the hollowing tools Bob had made. We used those tools on the second day to make Bob's signature icicle ornament and in the afternoon created eggs. The egg project got me ready for the cuts required for the second day's projects.

In the morning, we made an acorn birdhouse and, in the afternoon, worked on the icicle ornament. Much of the 2-day lessons turned into problem solving. For example, gluing the acorn body to a waste block with CA glue is pretty simple for some, but not if you are blind. Tip – do not put your hands in the glue (ask me how I know that!).

Since we returned, I've had several conversations with Bob via phone and e-mail. I have kept him current on my progress and have been collaborating with him on an article for the AAW American Woodturner magazine, scheduled for publication in fall 2008.

I would like to thank the many generous people at the COWs for encouragement and

assistance in helping me get started as a woodturner and supporting my continued education ... the American Association of Woodturners for generously awarding me the grant and making this opportunity possible ... and Bob Rosand for his patient and thorough tutoring. And I would be remiss to not thank my wife who supports my woodturning passion and took a weekend of her time to drive me to the lessons. Thank you, one and all! •




