Nov – Turn It and Burn It – any turning that includes pyrography as demonstrated in October or other burning techniques. Burning your name on the bottom does not count!

Dec – Take It to the House – any useful household item (bowls excluded) Items could be useful in any part of the home or garden.

New Young Turners Program

Thanks to the efforts of Dave Bowers, our chapter of the AAW has received a \$1,200 grant to start a Young Turners Program. The need for such a program is great because many of our schools industrial arts programs are being cut or greatly reduced. We need to help our young turners to learn how to turn safely and share the enjoyment that we all have of our craft.

We are looking for daughters, sons, granddaughters, and grandsons of our members to participate in our first sessions. Priority will be given to youth who are related to our members.

We envision two or three 1-day sessions this summer, for up to 8 youths each session. In the fall, we are thinking of a 1-day session with a nationally known

turner for 8 of the youths from the summer sessions. The summer sessions would achieve the first level of AAW certification. Those who complete the fall session and 4 projects from the AAW list would meet the second level of AAW certification and receive a free 1-year membership in the AAW.


























































Richmond VA June 20-22 Symposium

- Enjoy the Special Interest Night.



On Saturday, May 3, we will host guest turner J. Paul Fennell, known for his superthin hollowing that is done by inserting a very bright light into the piece. The light shines through the wood, making it possible to create a uniform and very thin wall. He also does elaborate design layout by creating his own indexing wheels and other fascinating gadgets. Many of his patterns are then pierced using a dental type drill. Cost for the Saturday demo will be \$25, including lunch. There will be at least one hands-on class. We hope to have all of the details finalized by the April meeting.























Highlights

sawyers in the early 1700s. It seems they developed chronic irritation of the nose and eyes, as well as headaches, from sawing bald cypress.

What are your chances of a reaction to wood? Statistics say that only 2 to 5% of all people develop an allergic sensitivity to one or more compounds found in wood. But, if you handle a lot

of potentially toxic species and work with them long enough, you increase your chances of an allergic reaction. And, with sufficient exposure, some woods bother almost everyone.


